ABOUT THE BARN

The Barn at Spring Brook Farm was developed from a passion project of founder Mary Beth Drobish, the former owner of the 17.5-acre West Chester, PA farm property on which The Barn resides. She felt called to combine her love of children with her passion for farm animals and sought to develop an environment where the two could co-exist in a healing way. She believed that children who are differently-abled would benefit physically, psychologically, cognitively, and developmentally from interactions with specially-selected, kid-sized farm animals—opportunities for learning not provided in a traditional education setting.

In 2005, The Barn was incorporated as a 501(c) (3) organization, and shortly thereafter, welcomed children with disabilities through its doors and into its lush fields and gardens. Through our mission to enrich the developmental skills and lives of children with disabilities through animal-assisted activities and nature-based experiences, we have substantiated Mary Beth’s belief in the valuable and measurably beneficial connection between animals, nature, and children.

As of 2021, we have new stewards of the farm on which The Barn is situated. Lynne and Tom Swartz purchased the property and have been wonderful supporters of our mission.

Mission Statement: To enrich the developmental skills and lives of children with disabilities and their families through animal-assisted and nature-based experiences.

Vision Statement: The Barn strives to be the leading regional organization and resource committed to providing children with disabilities and their families with nurturing and interactive, animal and nature-based experiences that bring joy and inspire them to pursue their best lives.

OUR PROGRAMS

The Barn accomplishes its mission through several programs: Camp Geronimo, Individual Programs, Educational Field Trips, Socialization Events, Life Skills/Community Services, and our Professional Clinical Assoc Program (PCAP). Our programs and reputation attract experienced, dedicated volunteers who, along with staff, provide outstanding one-to-one child/volunteer support to assure each child gets the attention needed.

The Barn's Outdoor Learning Center includes sensory gardens, raised beds for growing vegetables, a musical soundscape, and mud kitchens. Farm animals like miniature Sicilian donkeys and Nubian goats are especially suited for these young learners. The bonds between the animals, nature, and children are extraordinarily empowering and life-enriching. Not only do children at The Barn gain access to types of experiential learning often limited to traditional learners, but they also discover what it's like to be in a caretaker role. This builds invaluable skills for future life success. We believe it's an element that sets our program apart.

Each child grows during their time at The Barn. Amazing achievements are seen by families. These include but are not limited to identifying the feelings of adults, children, and animals based on body language/expressions; exhibiting positive social interactions with another child; demonstrating socially appropriate behaviors; making requests using full sentences; following multi-step directions; and engaging in "messy" activities without becoming upset.

Socialization Events: four seasonal Socialization Events geared to local families who have children with disabilities. These include an Autumn Festival, Summer Splash, Spring Fling and Winter Fest. The goal of these events is to provide families with opportunities to interact with one another and with The Barn staff and animals.



Camp Geronimo: a unique and fun summer day camp experience set in a safe, secure setting. Campers learn new skills and make new friends. Camp Geronimo is offered in six one-week sessions and can accommodate up to 96 children (16 per week) each summer. A minimum one-to-one ratio of counselors to campers allows children with a range of abilities to participate safely and successfully. A Registered Nurse is on site to ensure each child's medical needs are met.

Individual Program (IP): a one-on-one goal-based program offered to children on a weekly basis for 12 weeks (two six-week sessions) each spring and fall. Each participating child is paired with a trained volunteer for a weekly one-hour session. A Barn Activity Plan sets goals for the child and tracks progress over time. Child/volunteer pairs participate in activities that may improve fine and gross motor skills, develop communication skills, and build self-esteem.

Educational Field Trips: field trips are offered to groups of students from schools and organizations catering to the needs of differently abled children. Local participants include the Chester County Intermediate Unit, Downingtown Middle School, St. Edmunds Home for Children, Overbrook School for the Blind, Patton Middle School, and others.



2024 STATISTICS

477 CHILDREN SERVED

3,191 PROGRAM HOURS

We serve children from the Greater Philadelphia region and they come to us with diagnoses of autism spectrum disorder (ASD); Down syndrome; attention deficit hyperactivity disorder; cerebral palsy; physical disabilities; epilepsy; genetic disorders; and intellectual and developmental disabilities. Approximately 68% of the children served have ASD as a primary or secondary diagnosis.

While each child is unique in personality, needs and goals, all children experience The Barn's engaging and fun environment where evidence-based progress is made. Impact is measured through tracking data including 1) program hours; 2) number of children; 3) ability to individualize programming; 4) program satisfaction and 5) number of volunteer interactions. Pre-program assessments/surveys allow for individualized support and fun tailored activities for youth that maximize impact. Post-program surveys allow us to understand overall satisfaction and perceived programmatic outcomes. The Barn works with schools to provide visiting children with a fun and special experience during field trips. We measure and support our ability to provide financial support to those who need it.

SURVEY RESPONSES

Annually, staff analyze impact data to improve program delivery. Following each session, caregivers are surveyed about 1) whether the program met expectations; 2) whether they would re-enroll their child in programs; 3) whether they observed any positive carry-over behavior in other settings such as home or school; and other measurable input for assessing success.

2024 EXPENSE/REVENUE ALLOCATION

Every year, we worked diligently to ensure the majority of our revenue directly supported program expenses (82%). 4% of expenses were attributed to administration and 13.5% of expenses were attributed to fundraising. Total revenue in 2024 decreased by 8% over 2023's revenue and expenses in 2024 were 12% lower than in 2023.

The Barn's ability to draw funders to support its mission continued to grow through 2024. Funds raised through the Spring Fundraiser and Fall Hoe Down increased this year.

Each year, in addition to self-subsidizing our programs so they remain affordable, scholarships are provided for need-based financial assistance for children whose families might be faced with financial hardship.

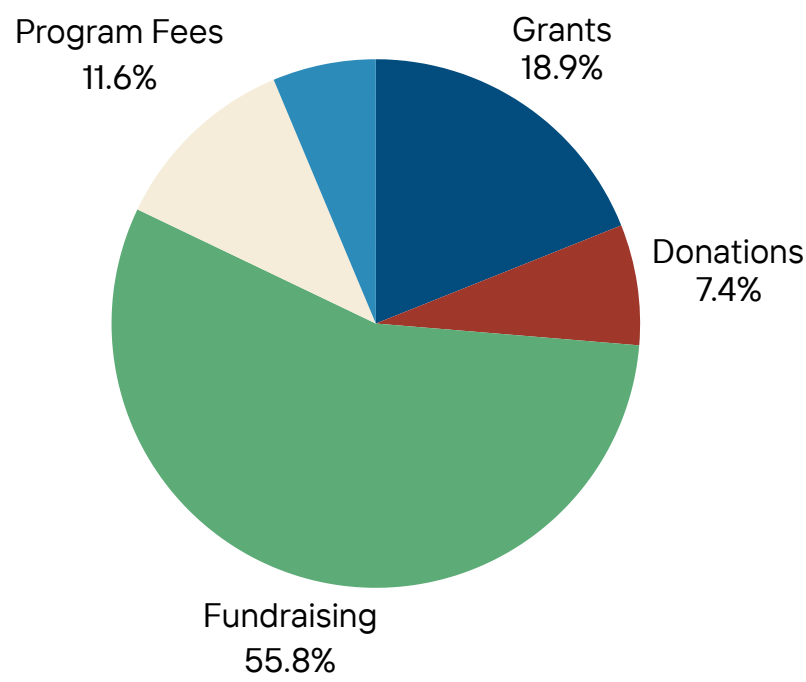
The Barn typically provides about 30% of the children we serve with financial support so they may participate in our programs. In 2024, almost 20% of the overall camp revenue was subsidized by scholarships.



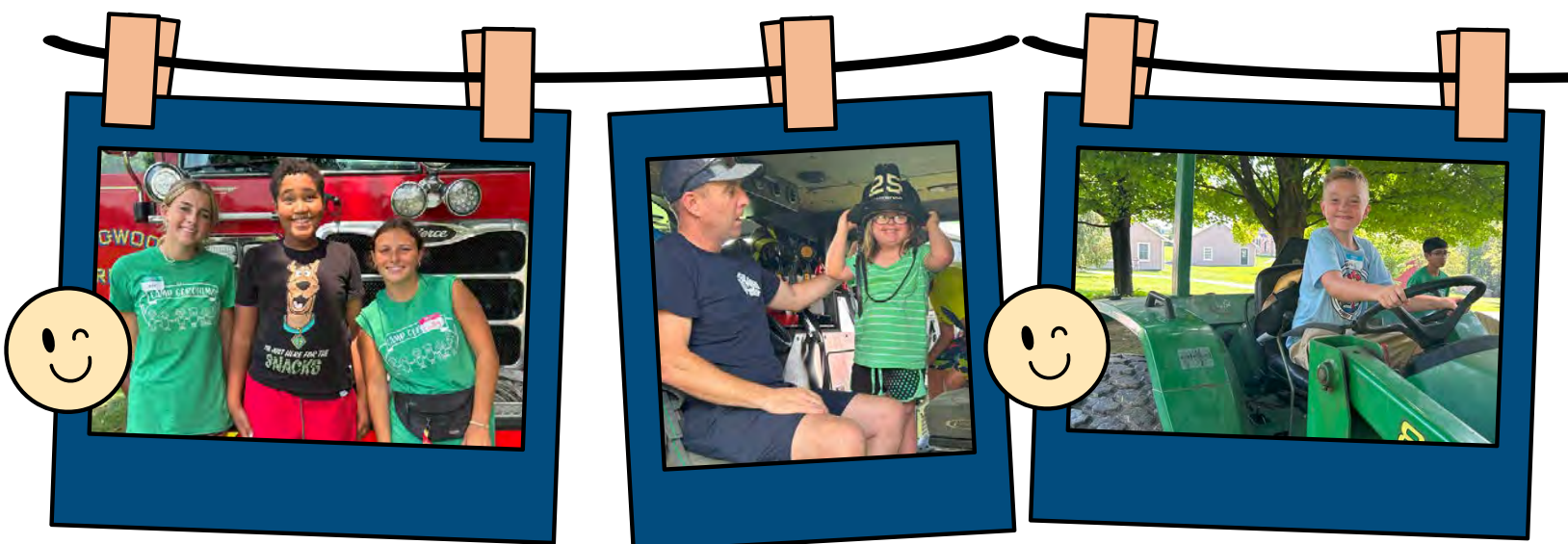
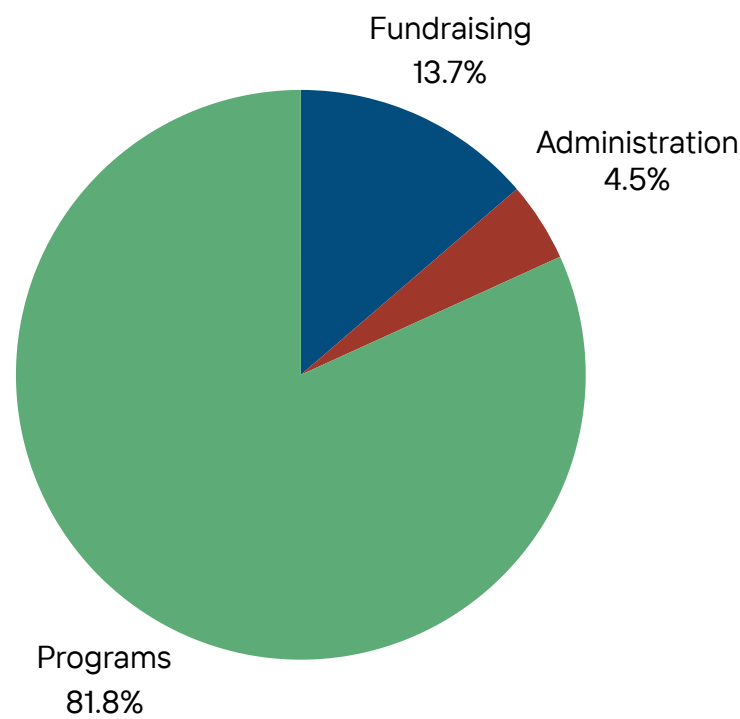
