ABOUT THE BARN

The Barn at Spring Brook Farm was a passion project developed by our founder Mary Beth Drobish, the former owner of the 17.5-acre West Chester, PA farm property on which The Barn resides. She felt called to combine her love of children with her passion for farm animals and sought to develop an environment where the two could co-exist in a special way. She believed that children who are differently abled would benefit physically, psychologically, cognitively, and developmentally from interactions with farm animals. These Barn experiences would create opportunities for learning not provided in a traditional education setting.

In 2005, The Barn was incorporated as a 501(c) (3) organization, and shortly thereafter, welcomed children with disabilities through its doors. Through our mission, we continue to uphold the valuable and beneficial connection between animals, nature, and children.

Our beautiful barn is home to 18 small-sized farm animals who are there to work and play. While at The Barn, children and teens are able to care for these furry friends by feeding, walking and grooming them. In doing these activities they often develop a special bond with the animals which can be very empowering and life-enriching.

This relationship has a unique impact, often breaking down barriers and allowing children and teens to just be themselves. They gain confidence and find themselves trying and doing new things. In caring for the animals, they discover what it's like to be in a caretaker role. This experience builds invaluable skills which lead to future growth, success, and happiness.

In addition to our wonderful animals, we want children and teens to enjoy our beautiful grounds and explore the natural world. By engaging in natural environments, children with disabilities explore science concepts through hands-on activities adapted to their diverse needs. The Barn's Outdoor Learning Center includes sensory gardens, raised beds for growing vegetables, a musical soundscape, mud kitchens and more. The Barn and its grounds are designed to be handicapped-accessible, so everyone is able to enjoy our special experiences. The Barn's setting and programming allow for unique learning experiences that set our programs apart from more traditional learning programs.



Mission Statement: To enrich the developmental skills and lives of children with disabilities through animal-assisted and nature-based experiences.

Vision Statement: The Barn strives to be the leading regional organization and resource committed to providing children with disabilities and their families with nurturing and interactive, animal and nature-based experiences that bring joy and inspire them to pursue their best lives.

OUR PROGRAMS

The Barn at Spring Brook Farm was established to provide a safe and nurturing environment where children can have fun while gaining real life skills. The experiences provide a unique opportunity for children to experience connections between animals and the natural world.

Individual Program

Our Individual Program (IP) enables children with disabilities to participate in animal-assisted and nature-based experiences, one hour a week in the fall and spring. During weekly visits, children enjoy planting/picking vegetables and flowers from gardens, exploring nature among 17 acres, and interacting with farm animals through grooming, feeding, and animal exercise. These activities are designed to promote confidence, as well as cultivate communication, socialization, safety awareness.

Each child is paired with a trained volunteer who encourages them to participate in and enjoy all aspects of Barn life. Our programming is designed to ensure that everyone benefits from our Barn experiences by embracing their personal goals and abilities. After completing our 6-week program, families are provided with an overview of accomplishments and achievements.

Teen Individual Program (TIP)

This program is geared towards teens ages 13-17. Teens have the opportunity to explore and take part in farm experiences like grooming, feeding, and exercising our animals, mucking stalls and tending to our gardens. They gain real life experience that leads to future growth.

Camp Geronimo

Camp Geronimo serves children ages 6-12 and welcomes campers of all abilities. It is a unique and fun summer day camp experience incorporating animals and nature. A one-to-one ratio of counselors to campers allows children with a range of abilities to participate safely and successfully. During the week campers learn new skills, experience exciting new adventures and make new and lasting friendships. Each week a registered Nurse is on site to ensure each child's medical needs are met.



Field Trips

We offer local schools and organizations serving the special needs community the opportunity to participate in our educational field trips. Children will enjoy various experiences including: interacting with our farm animals (feeding, walking and grooming them), taking a hayride along our beautiful grounds, playing in our Barn loft which includes a sensory gym, creating a fun natural craft, and exploring our Outdoor Learning Center (which includes sensory tables, a vegetable, herb and sensory garden, a musicscape and handicap accessible treehouse).

Quarterly Socialization Events

The Barn hosts several socialization events throughout the year which are open to our Barn Family and new friends looking for a fun time at the farm! These seasonal events are wonderful opportunities for Barn families to meet one another and for prospective families to visit The Barn to learn more about our programming. Visitors enjoy a hayride, and meet our farm friends, explore our Outdoor Learning Center and enjoy our barn loft.





2025 STATISTICS

364 CHILDREN & TEENS SERVED, 2,762 PROGRAM HOURS

Children from the greater Philadelphia region come to us with diagnoses of autism spectrum disorder (ASD), Down syndrome, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, cerebral palsy, physical disabilities, epilepsy, genetic disorders, and intellectual and developmental disabilities. In 2025, The Barn served 364 children from 61 schools and 28 school districts located in the Pennsylvania counties of Montgomery, Delaware, Chester and Philadelphia. We had 3 participants join us from Wilmington and Newark, Delaware as well.

With only three full-time staff, two part-time camp directors and a part-time barn helper, The Barn is reliant on volunteers to help with program delivery, facility maintenance, office help and more.

In addition to volunteers from our community, we partner with various colleges and universities allowing students earning clinical credit toward their professional degrees to gain experience working with children in a unique setting. 2025 EXPENSE/REVENUE ALLOCATION

Every year, we work diligently to ensure the majority of our revenue directly supports program expenses (81% this year). Due to facility improvements and staff changes, we had to cancel our 2025 Spring Individual & Teen Individual Program. This reduced our Individual and Teen Individual Program Fee revenue by nearly 50%.

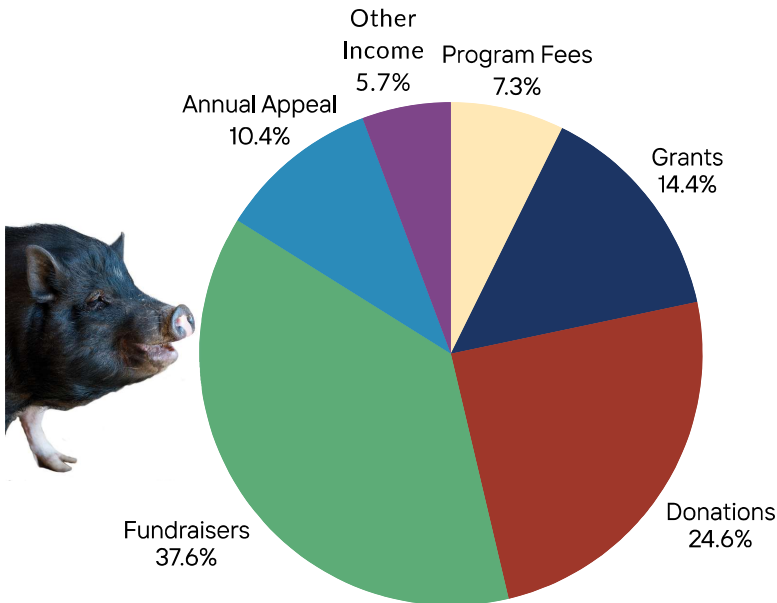
***This year The Barn received a very generous Capital Improvement Donation of \$125,740 which was used to purchase a new tractor, full Barn generator and Sensory Gym. (This number was not used in calculations for the pie charts below as the donation was slated for capital improvements)**

The Barn's ability to draw funders to support its mission continued to grow in 2025. Combined funds raised, even excluding the capital improvement donation, exceeded the prior year.

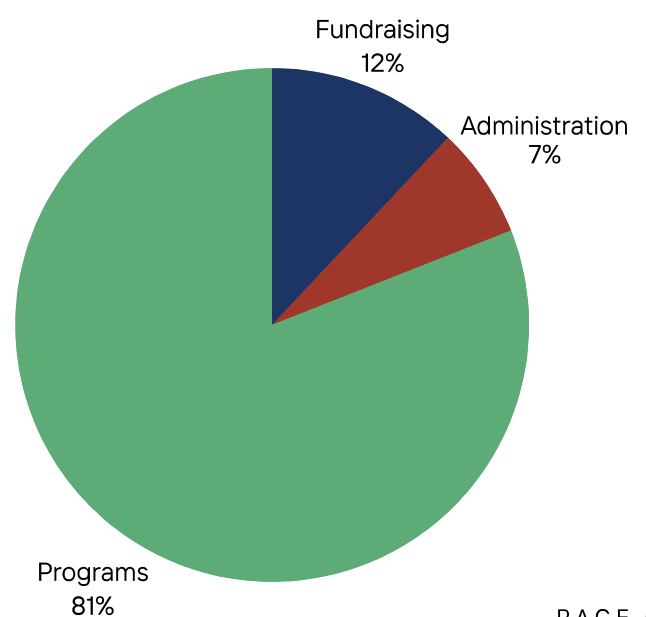
As part of our mission, we are dedicated to providing all children the opportunity to enjoy our programs. Each year, in addition to self-subsidizing our programs so they remain affordable, scholarships are awarded for need-based financial assistance for children whose families face financial hardship. **In 2025, The Barn provided financial aid awards to 27% of participants- 17% of the overall program revenue was subsidized by scholarships.**
